"THE ORANGE SHOW" TO REOPEN TO PUBLIC WITH KICK OFF BENEFIT SEPTEMBER 25 & 26

The Orange Show, a visionary, fantastical miniature Disneyland of sorts, constructed of masonry, wagon wheels, concrete blocks and elaborate handmade metal sculptures and gates, will reopen to the public October 9 and 10 following a family benefit weekend, September 25 and 26.

Included in the multilevel structure is a whimsical maze and a series of narrative exhibits all extolling the virtues of the orange.

Additionally, there is an enclosed museum, built around the idea of artist Jeff McKissack's own hardwork philosophy, a steam engine capable of demonstrating the idea of 'clean' energy to adults and children alike, and a small pond in which rides a steam-powered Mississippi River paddle—wheeler. This entire phenomenon was created by McKissack, alone, with his own hands, over a period of twenty-five years. And it wouldn't be complete without "The Side Show", a small performance area where events as varied as chamber music, mime or children's storytime will take place.

Jeff McKissack spent a quarter-century conceiving and constructing his private utopia, spelling out his personal philosophy and creating what he called a "health show." He believed that the orange was the perfect

energy, leaving no bad residues (cholesterol). McKissack, who was 52 years old when he began his work, crated and trucked oranges through Florida, Georgia and Alabama in his early years. Later, he settled in Houston and went to work for the Postal Service from which he retired to work full-time on his dream.

McKissack died in January, 1980, having lived to see the monumental task complete and to open The Orange Show to the public on May 9, 1979.

McKissack himself conducted tours from that time on whenever there were visitors to the Show.

In 1981, The Orange Show was purchased from McKissack's heirs by twenty-one concerned citizens who wished to restore and preserve this delightful folk-art masterpiece for everyone to enjoy. The Orange Show Foundation, a nonprofit organization, was formed at that time, undertook the necessary restoration of the Show and will now serve as its operator.

The Orange Show Foundation's goal is to preserve The Orange Show and develop it as a major cultural resource for the City of Houston. The Show will be open weekends beginning Saturday, October 9. For further information, please call 552-1767.
