## Biography

- 1871 John J. Makinen born in Kunkka, Finland.
- 1891 He marries Maria Matilde Niittilä.
- 1893 Along with his wife Maria Matilde, he moves to Chequamegon, Michigan as part of a major Finnish migration to that area.
- 1903 He moved near Kaleva Manistee County, attracted like many other Finns by the inexpensive land. He bought a farm and also worked as a clerk in a general store owned by the Siitolaisten newspaper company, which worked actively to attract Finnish settlers to central Manistee County. Later, he opened his own store, managing it while operating his farm.
- 1909 Makinen built his first bottle clad structure; a house.
- 1922 He formed a partnership with Alex Ketonen to create Northwestern Bottling Company, which produced soft drinks.
- 1932 By this year he discovered he had a surplus of bottles. He then built a stockhouse from the bottles, spelling the company's name in contrasting colors. The bottles, he discovered, provided an ideal insulating barrier due to their trapped air space.
- 1939 Following his retirement, Makinen left the farm and built a house in Kaleva using the surplus bottles, <sup>(over 60,000)</sup> from the bottling plant. The bottles were laid with their bottoms pointing outward, and the necks between the studs. The interior was covered with plaster board and plaster.
- 1942 After the house was finished but before he had a

chance to move in, Matinen died. Because of his ethnic background, the house became a symbol of Finnish determination and fortitude. After Mrs. Matinen died, the house continued to attract tourists, although it remained empty for several years.

1980 The house was purchased by the Keweenaw Historical Society to house its museum. Following restoration, the house became the focus of Finnish ethnic celebration in Marquette County. It is the only known battle house in Michigan.
