It has been a few years since we were in correspondence with you. SPACES is now eight years old and thriving; still working to preserve the folk art environments of California and the United States. Seven sites are now listed on the National Register of Historic Places and many more have been recognized with state landmark status.

Our archives and files have grown considerably and we are now making a concerted effort to fill in any gaps we may have regarding the history of the movement as well as individual sites and their makers.
