Re: John Medica's Castles & Garden - California State Landmark #939

John Medica is selling his property and escrow is closing sometime in January 1989. All I know at this time is that it was bought as a second home by a lawyer in San Francisco who claims he wants to keep it as it is.

I have a few questions.....

- (1) who owns the historic plaque?
 - a. if the site is destroyed
 - b, if the site loses its status
- (2) is the owner obliged to have public access to the site as a condition of historic status?
- (3) is there a tax benefit in keeping the site as it is?
- (4) how much or how little "alteration" to the site would make it lose its status?
 - a. the gardens and the rockwork
 - b. a rather ordinary stucco house

Also, if it is possible to get the NRHP nomination forms and the acceptance letter for the Watts Towers and the Underground Gardens (both 1977) it would be much appreciated.
