On his rural property of some 60 acres, Litto has decorated the fences, house, barns, sheds and trees with his collection of hubcaps (estimated to be 2,000 - 3,000 in number), plus bottles, cans, pencils, pots, pails, pieces of metal, bones saved from meals, cattle skulls, discarded toilets, road signs, creche, flower pot, lantern, TV-dinner plates, license-plate holders and bird houses.

Biography: Born in Italy, Litto moved to the U.S. (San Francisco) in 1907. Although he wanted to be a priest, he worked as a marble cutter--mosaic and terrazzo, and did contract work, from 1920's - 1940's. He so hated paying taxes, that he moved to Pope Valley in 1942, to farm. He was married (his wife died in 1954), had 7 children and 25 grandchildren.

Quotes: regarding his hubcaps, "I never buy, sell or give them away. I just collect. That's all." "When I die and go to heaven, I want a hubcap with my name and years I lived instead of a tombstone." regarding the bones, "I look at those bones and remember all those good meals." "I just did it." "I'm Litto. I'm here." "I didn't know myself why I started. People come, they bring hubcaps, and I hang them up. I didn't have no idea it was going to turn out like this." "This is my place; Litto's place. It's nobody's but mine. You can travel all you want, you don't see no hubcap ranch, no hubcap king all over the world."
